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Scripture: Luke 16:19-31 NRSVue

¹⁹ "There was a rich man who was dressed in purple and fine linen and who feasted sumptuously every day.

²⁰ And at his gate lay a poor man named Lazarus, covered with sores,

²¹ who longed to satisfy his hunger with what fell from the rich man's table; even the dogs would come and lick his sores.

²² The poor man died and was carried away by the angels to be with Abraham. The rich man also died and was buried.

²³ In Hades, where he was being tormented, he lifted up his eyes and saw Abraham far away with Lazarus by his side.

²⁴ He called out, 'Father Abraham, have mercy on me, and send Lazarus to dip the tip of his finger in water and cool my tongue, for I am in agony in these flames.'

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²⁵ But Abraham said, 'Child, remember that during your lifetime you received your good

things and Lazarus in like manner evil things, but now he is comforted here, and you

are in agony.

²⁶ Besides all this, between you and us a great chasm has been fixed, so that those

who might want to pass from here to you cannot do so, and no one can cross from

there to us.'

²⁷ He said, 'Then I beg you, father, to send him to my father's house—

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Message: Invisibility

Most of us have either had children or we have played with small children. Now

when I say children what I mean here is infants to toddlers. At that age one of the very

special things, you get to play with them is peek-a-boo which then develops into hide

and go seek. Babies get so excited with peek-a-boo because of a concept called object

permanence. Children at that age do not understand that just because they do not see

it does not mean it isn't there. Let's be honest, there are some adults who have this

issue too.

Hide and go seek was always one of my favorites as well. I know I've shared the

story in the past of Sophia and Olivia being younger and hiding behind the curtains of

our sliding glass door. You could clearly hear them and see their feet, but they felt it

was the best hiding place in the world and that you would never be able to find them.

The only reason this game ever worked was because as the adult you had to make the

choice not to find them and not to hear them.

Peek-a-boo and hide and go seek are both positive examples of ignoring the kids

to have a good time. There are, however, negative times this happens. There are times

where we put on blinders to not see. Either because we do not want to see or because

we are naive. An example I can give of that naivety was when I was growing up. I lived

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in an area that had a significant number of migrant workers working in the mushroom houses. Most of these individuals were illegal and I remember being in conversation with someone and they asked me if I knew anyone who was illegal. I said no and I don't think that's a problem where I live. That person kindly corrected me and said, yes you do and yes it is a problem and you are just choosing not to see it. They were correct.

Our parable today is in part about the blinders that we put on and in another part about the wealth that we have and what we choose to do with it. Some immediate context, Jesus has just been teaching on money as we read last week, the verses in between verse 13 and 19 deal with the Pharisees reaction. Their reaction was to if we translate the words literally, "turn up their noses." The Pharisees hated what Jesus had to say about how they should be treating others and their wealth.

In response to this "nose turning" Jesus tells another story however this story is far more blunt and painful for the Pharisees. The story of the rich man and Lazarus is one you may not have heard preached on in church. It is difficult and uncomfortable but that is the way most parables are supposed to be. Let's dive into it a bit and try to understand what is going on here. First it has to be stated that this is the only parable in the New Testament where Jesus names one of the people in the parable. We have the rich man, who is described guite...richly, then we have Lazarus, a name that

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means "one who God helps." It is partly ironic because God does not help him, but also because the rich man is supposed to help him.

Lazurus is placed before the gates of the rich man and while the rich man feasts, Lazarus is licked by the dogs. Now I always understood that text to be speaking about how unclean dogs are. Religiously speaking that is just a further sign of the disparity between Lazurus and the rich man however the idea being presented is more to the effect that the only ones who took pity on Lazarus were the dogs who share the same lowly social status. Eventually they both die and here is where things start to get interesting.

I want you to notice that the afterlife is not as we know it. We have this concept of heaven and hell in our minds and that is not how the ancient writers saw it. The rich man is in the place of the dead and Lazurus is with Abraham. This is not the same type of afterlife we tend to speak of. And again, it gets more interesting, the rich man recognizes Lazurus and even speaks of him by name. He doesn't speak to Lazurus only to Abraham. Basically, even in death the rich man doesn't stoop low enough to "need" Lazarus. Instead, he asks Abraham to boss Lazurus around.

The story wraps up with Abraham denying the rich man, and denying the request to warn his brothers. The reason? Because they have already been warned. On one hand I could talk about how this parable is about wealth and how we all should be

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lifting up others with our wealth. This is true but it is not the point. The point is that the

rich man ignored his responsibilities in life, we do not get to have that luxury. We have

received this warning; how we treat those around us matters.

We have our own blinders on. We see situations around us, and we choose to

ignore them, even though we know that we have a physical and spiritual responsibility

in the situation. This story is a warning to us to take our blinders off. In this story the

rich man and Lazurus are both children of Abraham. How many people do you write off

just because? How many do we ignore by accident because we are so caught up in

things we think are important like wealth.

One of the ideas I came across this week regarding this was that Abraham

doesn't send other signs because he knows they will be ignored. You see it's not a lack

of signs of God at work, is a lack of focus by us on what is most important. I invite you

this week to see what is important. Who do you treat as less than a person just

because? Who do you ignore, by accident or intentionally? These are the people we

are called to treat as children of God, because just like us, they are children of God.
