Scripture: Luke 20:27-38 NRSV

<sup>27</sup> Some Sadducees, those who say there is no resurrection, came to him <sup>28</sup> and

asked him a question: "Teacher, Moses wrote for us that if a man's brother dies

leaving a wife but no children, the man shall marry the widow and raise up

children for his brother.

<sup>29</sup> Now there were seven brothers; the first married a woman and died childless; <sup>30</sup>

then the second <sup>31</sup> and the third married her, and so in the same way all seven

died childless.

<sup>32</sup> Finally the woman also died. <sup>33</sup> In the resurrection, therefore, whose wife will

the woman be? For the seven had married her."

<sup>34</sup> Jesus said to them, "Those who belong to this age marry and are given in

marriage,

<sup>35</sup> but those who are considered worthy of a place in that age and in the

resurrection from the dead neither marry nor are given in marriage. <sup>36</sup> Indeed,

This scripture is going to take us a little bit of digging in order to

understand it, so please bear with me today. You see this passage is not one

that is easy to interpret for meaning in today's context. What I mean by this is

that some of you will look at it and say it is obviously about the resurrection

and the after life because it plainly says that. That's true, this passage is about

that, and we will talk about it but that is not what is at stake in this passage for

us today. If that were all that this story was about then why would we even get

this story? Do we really need a story about people asking Jesus a question

about the resurrection?

Let's go back in history a little bit. By Jesus' time there was a split into three camps in Judaism. Those three groups are the Pharisees, Sadducees, and the Zealots. We aren't going to talk about the Zealots. They do play a role in Christian theological development, but they aren't here in this passage today. What we are going to talk about are the Pharisees and the Sadducees. Somewhere around 200 or 100 BCE there was a split in Judaism that resulted in these two groups and what it has to do with at first is scriptural inclusion and interpretation.

The Sadducees used only the Pentateuch, or the first five books of the bible as the rule of faith and law. These were the scriptures that were given by Moses and had been handed down. They were the law. The Pharisees on the other hand wanted to include other books, including a recent addition in that time period of the book of Daniel. Daniel was a new type of literature, combining wisdom literature, prophecy, and apocalypse. You see the Pharisees had a more liberal interpretation.

As a result of this there came to be a significant difference of interpretation and theological thought. The Pentateuch doesn't suggest a resurrection at all. However, the book of Daniel does. It becomes a part of

common theological understanding, represented by the Pharisees. While the temple, represented by the Sadducees interpreted the law of Moses as not supporting the idea of a resurrection. If we fast forward to Jesus' time we see Jesus is in the same theological camp as the Pharisees. That there is a resurrection and our passage today is the recording of the only interaction Jesus had with the Sadducees in the Gospel of Luke.

I am someone who likes a good, spirited discussion. I've always enjoyed that, I like the idea of testing the metal of different ideas and seeing where there are weaknesses in those ideas. I've always enjoyed that activity. What I don't enjoy is someone who discusses things in bad faith. You have all experienced this, it happens often in one of two ways. One, the person poses a question that is intentionally misleading, and they want to trap you. This is known as a 'gotcha' question. Or the person talks down or over you. There are many examples of this today. Ben Sharpiro, Matt Walsh, Bill O'Riely, and Sean Hannity. All of them operate in this manner in discussions. They ask bad faith questions, intended to catch people who don't have the depth of knowledge, with no real intent to learn or understand.

The Sadducees come to Jesus with just such a question. A question

based in their world view, the view of only Moses' writings being the official

writings of the religion and posit a question based on that. Their question is

founded within the law, the expected actions of the Jewish people. The bad

faith part comes at the end "who will be her husband in the resurrection?" In

other words, do you see how stupid your position is? Now Jesus, Jesus gives a

masterful response. Basically, he meets them where they are at. He meets

them in the Pentateuch, and he points out a flaw in their argument. Look at

verse 37 and 38 -

<sup>37</sup> And the fact that the dead are raised Moses himself showed, in the story about

the bush, where he speaks of the Lord as the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac,

and the God of Jacob.

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<sup>38</sup> Now he is God not of the dead but of the living, for to him all of them are alive."

You see, Jesus points out that basically every time God talks about the

patriarchs, you know Abraham, Issac, and Jospeh, that God does it in the

present tense. In other words, to God these guys are still alive, so how can you

say you know that the resurrection is stupid?

Now I could talk about this as evidence of the resurrection but again I

don't think that is the lesson we are to pull from this passage. I think the

lesson is two-fold. One is do not argue in bad faith, and two we don't really

know what the age to come looks like, so stop trying to define it.

I think Jesus is telling us, at least in part, to not be like the Sadducees

and argue in bad faith. Instead, we should be humble and learn from one

another. All the "debaters" I listed earlier are seen as great debaters in certain

circles. Some are even seen as people who are defending the faith, whether

that faith is Christian or Jewish. I think they miss the point, they aren't humble

before God learning from one another and growing in faith. Instead, they are

"defending" a dead faith, not one that is listening to God and growing, like the

Pharisees demonstrated.

The second lesson is that we focus to much on trying to figure out what

the world to come will look like. Notice I said world to come, the alternate is

age to come. This is the terminology that Jesus uses, it is the terminology of

ambiguity. It is intentionally not Heaven by Jesus, and I think that is important.

We want certainty in the face of eternity but instead Jesus points us to faith.

Humble ourselves before God, before eternity, realize you can't figure it all out

and that you can't trick people into believing the right thing. But what you can

do is be faithful with what you have, to follow faithfully seeking to see and hear

God in the world around you and in others. That is what will make you a child

of the next age and not one of this age. A spirit willing to listen to God and

follow Gods leading. Do you think God needs you to defend Gods' self? Is God

not big enough to prove Gods' self? You are called to humbly follow and

sometimes realize you don't have all the answers. Amen.
