minds not to prepare your defense in advance, ¹⁵ for I will give you words [c] and a

wisdom that none of your opponents will be able to withstand or contradict. ¹⁶ You will

be betrayed even by parents and siblings, by relatives and friends, and they will put

Message: What hair?

I'd like to look at you today and say that this scripture is easy. It's easy to

understand and it's easy to live by. Now it wouldn't be the first time I lied to you to lure

you into a false sense of security, but I'm not doing that today. This is a passage that is

naturally confusing and disconcerting. Now it's concerning because it's about the end

of times. It's what we might refer to as an apocalyptic passage. It seems predominantly concerned with the end of time. I don't know about you, but I've never really found the end of times to be something comforting or comfortable to think about.

This passage is also confusing. It's confusing because it ends with "but not a hair of your head will perish." And frankly by any way you interpret this passage people, Christians, have been harmed and killed in the name of their faith. So, what is this passage trying to teach us? I want to lay that out for you right away here at the beginning.

I think this passage wants us to learn about endurance in faith. Bear with me and I'll explain this in more depth as we understand some of the historical stuff around this passage.

This passage can be interpreted in two ways that are predominantly determined by when you think Luke was written. In 70 CE a major event happened in the life of Israel and the early Church, the destruction of Herod's temple by the Roman Legions. This was an event that sent theological shockwaves through both religious groups and is the event responsible for many of the reasons each group became the way it did. Our passage today is directly about the destruction of the temple. If you believe the Gospel of Luke was written before the destruction of the temple in Jerusalem then you are going to interpret this passage as a prediction of the future. That Jesus was

predicting that the temple was going to be destroyed and that he was theorizing what the ramifications of those actions would be. If the temple hasn't been destroyed then the purpose of this story is to warn the followers of Christ to steel themselves to follow Christ no matter what.

The second interpretational option is that the Gospel of Luke was written *after* the destruction of the temple. Since it was written afterwards this passage is not theorizing the ramifications, but talking *about* those ramifications. If the temple has already been destroyed then the purpose of the story is different as well. Instead of being about steeling ourselves to follow Christ, the author of Luke is suggesting that we see the testimony of those who have already lived through bad times as the example to emulate and hold on to.

I tend towards the second interpretation. This is not because I think there can't be prediction in the Bible, it's because if I'm looking at it to try and understand what it means for us today then the second interpretation makes more sense. You see this isn't about being ready and following Christ. It's about remembering people like Stephen in the book of Acts who was brought to trial and died for his faith. It's about putting our faith, not in the temple made by human hands, but relying on God to walk with us through the bad times.

I have had this problem with persecution complex with Christians for a long time. I grew up and lived around many theologically conservative people. Some of whom I still have great respect for, yet I heard many teachings and much encouragement about us remaining faithful to Christ because the end is coming. That *is not* the point of the Christian faith. It is that our faithfulness with Christ "will gain your souls," to put it as our scripture does today. It's about walking in faith every step of the way and trusting in

God and Gods leading as opposed to the strength of the church building.

Most of us have lived long enough to experience this. We have experienced high times and low times in our lives. Times of plenty and times of scarcity. God doesn't promise that everything will be okay, that is not what "but not a hair on your head will perish," means. It means that God will be with us as we endure whatever is coming our way. God never leaves or forsakes any of us. I for one believe we all need that reminder. Sometimes we can feel so alone, cut off from others. We feel that we are experiencing something that no one else ever has, and we don't know how to deal with it. The reality is there is nothing new under the sun, and God is already there. God is already watching over you in love, walking with you in love, and encouraging you to listen for his voice. Amen.
