# **Message: Apathy**

I still remember this lesson that was given to me by my high school English teacher. Now mind you that this man was not popular with my family for a number of reasons. I grew up in a smaller community than Cottonwood, so history and reputation has a way of sticking around a lot longer than it has a right to. I don't remember the context of this lesson, but I remember that somehow we were talking about opposite emotions. The emotion we were talking about specifically was love. Obviously, most people said the opposite of love was hate however this teacher had a different opinion. His opinion was that the opposite of love is apathy.

My teacher's argument for apathy is that if you hate someone you still have some form of emotion for them. However, if you don't care what happens to them, in other words are apathetic to them, than you are freed from the emotions of caring. At the time I remember agreeing that this concept makes sense, as I've gotten older I have found it to be more and more true.

Our emotions tell us a lot about ourselves, what we care about, who we care about, and what we are going to do. Our theme today for Advent is love and our scripture doesn't seem to have much to do with love. To be honest it doesn't. You see there are two ways I can take this passage. I can talk about it in relation to the virgin birth and the expectations of the birth of Christ. Or I can take it from the historical perspective and dive into what the passage is speaking about in the time it was written. However, I'm going to take a third option and reflect as I started on our emotions.

If we talk about this in the New Testament context then we are left with a discussion about whether or not prophetic work is future telling. Which its not. Or what the meaning of virgin is, which I think it's difficult to find a more non-Christmas topic than virginity. If we talk about it from the Old Testament perspective then we are talking about how this passage is really about the lack of trust that King Ahaz has for God, such distrust that Isaiah's prophecies are proved with a very ordinary event, the birth of a child.

Instead, a thread that combines both of these is our reaction to emotions. Ahaz was reacting about trusting God, so God responded with a common example to show how trustworthy God is. The New Testament writers were concerned about seeing God at work, and they pointed to a common banal thing, the birth of a child to prove that. You see how we choose to respond tells us a lot about ourselves.

When I brought up love and apathy I started to try and think about when I have shown apathy and to be honest I don't have many examples. One big example from my life is I don't really care what people think about how I dress. I try and share this with the kids at the school, be less concerned with how your looks are perceived but more concerned with being who you are. Even this example however doesn't really make the point. Personally, I would rather respond with love rather than apathy. I would rather be known for loving too hard, than for not caring for those around me.

Perhaps that is what we need to capture or recapture about the Advent and Christmas season. Maybe we shouldn't be afraid to show others who we love or how we love. Maybe we shouldn't be afraid to say I love you to others, or hug one another, or care for one another. Ultimately when we talk about the incarnation, "God with us," "Emmanuel" we are talking about just that. That God loves you so much that God couldn't be separated from you. God loves you so much that God is willing to look foolish just for you, and correct me if I'm wrong but I thought we were to imitate God. Maybe it's time to love and to love hard. Amen.
